





Signing your work

If you're giving this piece as a special gift for a loved one, it's a nice idea to stitch a tiny signature onto your work. Simply chart your initials or name – and the date you finished stitching – onto graph paper, and then backstitch in the bottom-right corner of the design. Choose one of the colours that's used in the design already, so that the signature blends in but is still clear and readable. Black cotton may be too harsh – dark green, grey or brown might work better.

Fruit picking

To give this scene depth of colour, I've chosen fruits that come in different shades, like red and green apples, and deep purple plums. I also decided to depict one of the apples cut in half, as this reveals yet another layer of colour and creates more interest. Green and yellow foliage and red rosehips complete the scene.



Feathered friends

If you suddenly notice that your resident garden blackbird hasn't been popping by, there's a very good reason. In the autumn, blackbirds head out to the wider countryside where they take advantage of the bountiful hedgerows, feeding themselves up for winter. I think the two blackbirds bring life to this scene, and also a lovely contrast in colour with their jet-black feathers.

This design was stitched using DMC stranded cotton on 28-count evenweave over two threads of the fabric

How to keep your work neat

In between stitching sessions, roll up your work and store it inside a cardboard tube to protect it from dust. If you stitch in a hoop, pop the hoop in a pillowcase. If you use a frame, try an elasticated cot sheet to cover the whole frame while it's not in use.
